On behalf of the Coalition for the Student Green Energy Fund, we would like to request your support for the Student Green Energy Fund. Our coalition is comprised of students from every state university in Florida who have been working since 2007 to encourage the state of Florida to allow universities and students to implement the Student Green Energy Fund.

The Student Green Energy Fund is a proposal to the Board of Governors to grant students the right to vote every three years to establish a \$.25 minimum to a \$1 maximum per-credit-hour energy fee. The revenue generated would fund projects that reduce campus utility costs and increase academic funding.

Our generation of students is paying much more for its education now than it was a few years ago, and we recognize that costs will continue to increase in the near future. Yet despite increasing costs, we are arguably even more burdened by the academic budget cuts. Our classes sizes are growing, faculty are leaving us for jobs elsewhere, and many of us are being forced to change majors or change universities.

Utility costs are typically a university's second greatest expense and a drain on university resources. If the Student Green Energy Fund is approved by students on individual campuses through referendum elections, the new revenue will empower universities to mitigate the burden of the budget cuts and increase academic funding. To assess student interest in this idea, nonbinding referenda have been conducted at six universities over the past couple of years on the Student Green Energy Fund, and students have voted overwhelmingly in support of the concept every time.

The Student Green Energy Fund concept has been created by students, voted on by students, and even brought to the Florida Legislature by students. If passed by the Board of Governors, and then implemented on individual campuses, students will continue to have a direct say over whether or not they wish to continue to pay the energy fee by voting on it every three years in binding student referenda. Ultimately all we are asking for is the right to decide for ourselves if we would like to make an investment in our education.

Student Green Energy Fund – Executive Summary

The Student Green Energy Fund is a proposal to grant students enrolled in the Florida State University System the right to vote to establish a campus energy fund at their university. The proposal will be presented to the Florida Board of Governors for consideration.

Proposal Outline

- Students **vote** in a campus-wide referendum election called by the University's Student Government to establish or not establish a campus renewable energy fee.
- If established, funds generated from the fee must be spent on projects that reduce campus energy costs.
- The proposed fee could not surpass \$1 per-credit-hour initially and would generate **\$1,299,350** for energy efficiency and renewable energy projects at the University of Central Florida alone; **\$7,785,124** across the entire State University System.¹
- A committee comprised of 50% members appointed by the University President and 50% members appointed by the Student Body President would allocate the funds collected.
- Any subsequent fee increase would require another student referendum election.
- The fee would sunset every three years and a student referendum election would be called to determine if the fee should be maintained or abolished.

Proposal Benefits

- Reduces University Energy Costs [University of Central Florida used as an example]
 - o Energy costs typically are a university's 2nd greatest expense behind personnel; **\$13,627,338** at UCF.²
 - During fiscal year 2008-09, UCF invested approx. \$800,000 in energy efficiency projects for \$564,654 yearly savings.³ The proposal will generate \$1,299,350 more a year at UCF for such projects, possibly allowing the university to almost double these yearly savings.
 - The funds generated will allow students to help their universities save money on utility costs and thus make more funds available for academics—funds sorely needed given recent budget cuts.
 - o Proposed fee would not be covered by Bright Futures, thus having no outside budgetary impact.

Creates Job Opportunities

New employment opportunities for Energy Services Companies and university physical plants will be created in order to engineer and maintain the energy efficiency and renewable energy projects funded by the proposal.

Student Supported

- o At **six** of Florida's eleven universities, including all major institutions, students have already voted overwhelmingly in favor of the proposal in student referendum elections.
- o Students will vote to establish the Student Green Energy Fund every three years, ensuring that all students have the opportunity to express further input during their college career.
- The Student Green Energy Fund will be the lowest costing per-credit-hour student fee and will allow students to see long-term savings in their academics.
- o The proposal has been accepted by numerous universities outside of Florida with student support.

• Invests in Environmental Sustainability

By investing in energy efficiency and renewable energy projects that reduce energy costs, universities will simultaneously be investing in environmental sustainability and reducing their ecological footprints.


