Course Description: An overview of American Studies, the interdisciplinary study of American culture. Analysis of the arts and literature, including music; social issues; popular culture; material culture; cultural diversity; and social change.

Course objectives and Learning Outcomes: This course introduces students to the interdisciplinary techniques and scope of American Studies.

Students completing this course will understand the interdisciplinary techniques of American Studies as a discipline; how film, music, and other arts embody cultural values; and how social factors combine in the production of regional and national cultures and identities.
