Florida Government and Politics Survey, 2023

Topline Results

Summary: Researchers at the University of South Florida conducted a statewide survey of 600 adult Floridians as a supplement to the *Government and Politics in Florida*, 4th edition. The survey examined public opinions on a range of issues, including approval of the Governor and State Legislature, political climate, education policy, housing policy, and healthcare policy. This report provides topline results from the survey, which was fielded between June 3rd and June 13th, 2023. Results are reported with a confidence level of 95% and a margin of error +/- 4.0.

Survey Information

2,500 American adults were surveyed via an online web-panel (Prodege MR). The survey was fielded from February 27th through March 9th 2023, and the results are reported with a 95% confidence level and a margin of error of +/- 1.96. Respondents were selected via stratified, quota sampling to ensure a representative sample. Balanced quotas for gender, age, race/ethnicity, education and party affiliation were determined based on data from the U.S. Census Bureau. Quotas were stratified by Census region for geographical representativeness.

He has regularly taught the state and local government and politics and Florida government and politics, and political behavior, public opinion, and elections courses, as well as a number of graduate public administration courses at USF and written over 60 articles and book chapters about county and municipal government, state-local and inter-local relations, urban government and politics, Florida government and politics, government finance, COVID-19's impact on U.S. local governments, intergovernmental relations, and American federalism and is also the author or co-author of over 40 technical reports and "white papers." In addition, he has written five books: *State-Local Relations in Florida* (1985), *Intergovernmental Relations and Public Policy* (1986), *Counties as Service Delivery Agents: Changes Roles and Expectations* (2002), *Florida Government and Politics*, 3rd edition (2008), *Sources of Local Government Revenue: Persisting Challenges and Emerging Opportunities* (2023) and has two forthcoming books (*Florida Government and Politics*, 4th edition and *Elgar Encyclopedia of Local and Regional Government*). Dr. Benton is a former Managing Editor of *State and Local Government Review* and frequently serves as a political commentator for the local, state, national, and international print and electronic media. He is also a former President and Secretary-Treasurer of the Florida Political Science Association and the 2009 recipient of the organization's Manning Dauer Award for his "sustained exemplary record of research, teaching, mentoring and service related to Florida politics and policy."
