The individuals that were recognized are USF purchasing agents, and other employees and community leaders that contributed tremendously to the Supplier Diversity initiative implemented a little over a year ago. A total of \$27 million was spent with diverse suppliers due to their support.

Supplier diversity programs can't simply sit in the background and hope organizations and suppliers find them. Supplier diversity personnel must be active in groups, events, discussions and should be able to reach out to professionals, stakeholders and advocates and of

course suppliers themselves. Marketing the program and its achievements and success help demonstrate the organizations commitment to supplier diversity.

Ensure you're being heard and are building relationships, exchanging best practices, offering development initiatives, participate in committees and table talks and panel discussions! Alliances with advocacy groups such as the National Minority Supplier Development Council, Women's Business Enterprise National Council, National Association of Women Business Owners and others can help by positively branding your program through interactions and collaborations which facilitate and strengthen partnerships. 


What Should You Do with Your Diverse Business Certification?
