

Bachelor of Arts in Communication Sciences and Disorders/Interpreter Training

The ITT concentration seeks to educate students to become interpreters for deaf individuals. A program of 49 credit hours is planned for the student majoring in the Interpreter Training concentration. Course content is distributed across five categories of information and skills necessary for a career in Interpreting: Role of the Interpreter in various settings; Cognitive, Psychosocial, and Language Development of Hearing and Deaf Children in Public Schools; Techniques and Applications of Interpreting; Professional Practices of the Interpreter; and Internship. The course of study for the ITT concentration assumes that the student has completed the language proficiency prerequisites in American Sign Language.
