

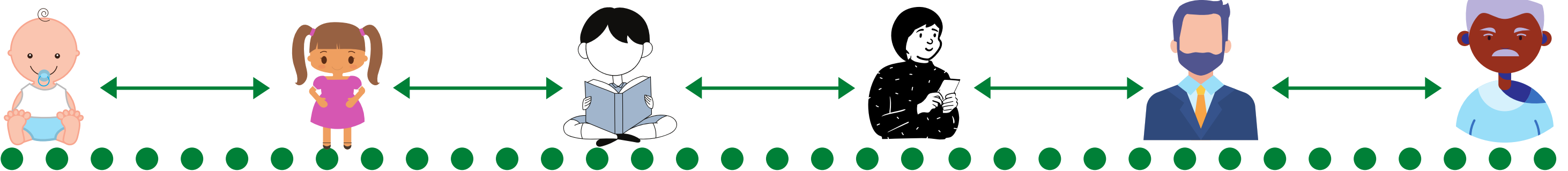
What is a Speech-Language Pathologist?

The American Speech-Language-Hearing Association defines Speech-Language Pathologists ("SLPs") as those who "work to prevent, assess, diagnose, and treat speech, language, social communication, cognitive-communication, and swallowing disorders in children and adults."

SLPs work with clients across the lifespan - from babies born in the NICU to older adults in long term care.
