I. Introduction

This is the Baker Act Annual Report for Fiscal Year (FY) 2019-2020. It contains information for several prior years in addition to FY 2019-2020.

Chapter 394, Florida Statutes, The Florida Mental Health Act, also known as the "Baker Act," includes several data reporting requirements. Section 394.463(2)(e), Florida Statutes, requires the Florida Department of Children and Families (Department) to publish an annual report. Florida Administrative Code 65E-5 specifies data submission requirements and that forms be submitted by Baker Act Receiving Facilities to the Baker Act Reporting Center at the University of South Florida. Forms must be submitted to the Baker Act Reporting Center within five working days after the person arrived at the receiving facility. Forms that must be submitted include:

The Baker Act Reporting Center receives these documents, enters data from them, and produces reports on behalf of the Department. The Baker Act Reporting Center is housed in the Department of Mental Health Law and Policy, de la Parte Florida Mental Health Institute, College of Behavioral and Community Sciences at the University of South Florida. See the <u>Baker Act Reporting Center</u> website for additional information. Section 394.463(2)(e), Florida Statutes, requires the Department to publish an annual report using the aforementioned forms. New to this annual report for FY 2019-2020 is information on:

- Person level data reporting;
- Additional age breakdowns to include counts of the 25-64 age group;
- Pandemic-related analysis;
- Seasonality and time of involuntary exam initiation;
- Law enforcement agencies initiating involuntary exams; and
- Mobile Response Teams (MRTs).

Involuntary exams occur at Baker Act receiving facilities.

- Designated receiving facilities include hospitals licensed under Chapter 395, Florida Statutes, and Crisis Stabilization Units (CSUs), licensed under Chapter 394, Florida Statutes.
- The Department designates all Baker Act receiving facilities, public and private.
- CSUs are mainly residential units of community mental health centers and receive Department funds for Baker Act related services.
- CSUs designated for children are referred to as Children's Crisis Stabilization Units (CCSUs).
 All CSUs/CCSUs are Baker Act receiving facilities; not all Baker Act receiving facilities are CSUs or CCSUs.
- Receiving facilities that receive funding from the Department are referred to in this report
 as "public," while facilities that do not receive Department funding are referred to as
 "private."

Involuntary Exam Initiation Times

Early Morning is the LEAST common time for involuntary exam initiations.

Mid-Afternoon is the MOST common time for involuntary exam initiations.

The patterns for children and older adults differed from the other age groups.

Children are more likely than other age groups to have their invountary exams intiated in the afternoon or evening.

Older adults were more likley than other age groups to have their involuntary exam initiated in the afternoon and less likely to have them initiated in the evening.



III. Exam and Person Level Reporting

This section of the report includes counts of involuntary exams for the past five fiscal years (15-16 to 19-20) for multiple age groups. The data reported includes:

- Counts of involuntary exams according to:
 - o the type of initiator (law enforcement, professional certificate or ex-parte);
 - o evidence type (harm, self-neglect, or both harm and self-neglect); and
 - o harm type (to self, to others, or to self and others).
- Types of health professionals who initiated involuntary exams
- Pandemic-related analysis (starting on page 19)
- Information about involuntary exams at each:
 - o Baker Act receiving facility (starting on page 31), and
 - o Law enforcement agency (starting on page 38).

A. State Level Analyses

There were 202,598 involuntary exams in FY 2019-2020 for 128,193 people. Counts of involuntary exams are shown for all ages for five years in Table 1a and by age groups in Table 1b. The Year-to-Year Percent change column for involuntary exams and population are shown in Table 1a and 1b to allow for a comparison between the change in involuntary exams and the population. For example, from 2015-2016 to 2016-2017 involuntary exams increased by 2.88%, while the population increased by 1.70%. This means that the increase in involuntary exams cannot be accounted for only by an increase in population.



Table 1b shows for each age group for each fiscal year the count of involuntary exams and the percentage of total involuntary exams accounted for in that year by that age group. For example, in FY 2019-2020, 17.75% of involuntary exams were for children (< 18) at the time of the involuntary exam, 12.36% for people 18-24, 61.44% for people 25-64, and 7.30% for people 65 and older. Counts of involuntary exams for all ages and by age group are shown in Figure 1a.

Figure 1a: Involuntary Exams in Five Fiscal Years for All Ages and by Age Groups




There are several factors that may have contributed to the decrease in involuntary exams in FY 2019-2020. These factors must be viewed in its entirety in order to understand the impact on involuntary examinations for Fiscal Year 2018-2019 to 2019-2020. These factors include the pandemic-related factors:

- Designated receiving facility capacity and closures;
- > Changes to law enforcement and designated receiving facility transportation processing procedures; and
- > Modifications to school schedules from brick and mortar to virtual learning.

These factors are currently being investigated to learn more about their association with this decrease. It is important to note that this decrease in involuntary exams does not mean there was a reduction in the need for mental health crisis services. Figure 1b is provided and formatted with a different scale for the vertical axis to be able to zoom in to see the change over time for children (< 18), young adults (18-24) and older adults (65+) that is difficult to see on Figure 1a.

Counts of involuntary exams by age group are presented in Table 2. The percentage of total exams and the percentage within each age group are also included. For example, involuntary exams for older adults aged 65 to 74 accounted for 4.72% of all involuntary exams during the fiscal year and 64.66% of involuntary exams for older adults (65+). Less than 2% of involuntary exam were missing the date of birth necessary to compute age and are shown as "Age Not Reported" in Table 2.



Initiation Type, Evidence Type, and Harm Type:

Involuntary exams may be initiated by law enforcement, certain health professionals, and via ex parte order (see Figure 2). Types of health professionals that initiated involuntary exams are shown in Table 3. There must be evidence of harm, neglect, or both harm and neglect (see Figure 3). Harm is further described as being to self, others, or both self and others (see Figure 4).

Initiation Type: 51.89% of the involuntary exams in Fiscal Year 2019-2020 were initiated by law enforcement; 46.12% were initiated by an individual with a professional certificate; and 1.98% were initiated via ex parte order.

Figure 2: Initiation Type for Fiscal Year 2019-2020





Professional Certificate Type: Percentages of involuntary exams by individuals with a professional certificate are shown in Table 3. Children are more likely than other age groups to have their involuntary exams initiated by licensed mental health counselors and licensed clinical social workers and less likely than other groups to have them initiated by physicians.


Evidence Type: Over half (53.41%) of involuntary exams were based on evidence of harm only. One-third (35.65%) were based on harm and self-neglect. Nearly ten percent (9.94%) of involuntary exams were based on evidence of self-neglect only. Evidence type was not reported on forms for 2.86% of involuntary exams. Neglect only was more common and harm only was less common as age increased.





Harm Type: Harm can be further broken down into harm to self and/or harm to others. The percentage of involuntary exams that had harm as an evidence type (either harm only or harm and neglect) by harm type is shown in Figure 4. More than three quarters (67.35%) of involuntary exams with harm as an evidence type were based on evidence of harm to self only. One quarter (25.85%) of involuntary exams with harm as an evidence type were based on both harm to self and harm to others. Harm to others only was the evidence upon which 6.80% of involuntary exams with harm as an evidence type were initiated. The most striking aspect of Figure 4 is how similar the proportions are across age groups.






<u>Time of Involuntary Exams</u>²: New to this report is an analysis of the time of day the involuntary exam was initated. The time is documented on the law enforcement (<u>CF-MH3052a</u>) and health professional (<u>CF-MH3052b</u>) forms from which data is entered. Time of involuntary exam initiation for both types of initations (law enforcment and health professional) rounded to the nearest hour is shown in Figure 5a. The overall patterns show mid-afternoon (2 pm to 5 pm) hours are the most common time for involuntary exams and early morning hours (3 am to 7 am) are the least common.


² The percentages in Figures 5a, 5b, and 5c sum to 100% for each age group (each line in the figure). For example, the percentage for each time point for the 5-17 year old age group sum to 100%, and so forth for each age group. This allows for comparison of the proportion for each group at each time point even though the total counts of involuntary exams differ (such as with many fewer for children than for adults). Note that the vertical axis for the next three figures goes from 0% to 10% because no group had a time period (hour of the day) with more than 10% of involuntary exams in that time period.

Figure 5a: Time of Involuntary Exam Initiation by Age Groups – Fiscal Year 2019-2020






Figure 5c: Time of Involuntary Exam Initiation by Type of Initiator (Law Enforcement and Health Professional) – Fiscal Year 2019-2020

The pattern of times (rounded to the nearest hour) for involuntary exams of children according to the type of initiator (law enforcement or health professionals) is shown in Figure 5c. Exact times were rounded to the nearest hour to assist with the categorization of time frames.

The pattern of times (rounded to the nearest hour) for involuntary exams of children by whether the initiation was on a weekend or weekday and by age (child and adult) is shown in Figure 5d. Exact times were rounded to the nearest hour to assist with the categorization of time frames.

Figure 5d: Time of Involuntary Exam Intiatition by Weekend/Weekday and Adults/Children




Time of Involuntary Exam Initiation Rounded to the Nearest Hour

B. Person Level Reporting

This section of the report includes counts of people with involuntary exams categorized by gender, race, ethnicity, and age. This is in contrast to Section III of this report, which includes counts of involuntary exams (but not counts of people). There were 128,193 people with at least one involuntary exam in Fiscal Year 2019-2020. The count of people with involuntary exams in a given time period is always less than the count of involuntary exams because some people have more than one involuntary exam.³

Gender, Race, and Ethnicity



For all ages, more men (53.48%) than women (45.91%) had involuntary exams. This is the same pattern for people 18-24 and 25-64. Involuntary exams for older adults are almost equally divided between men (49.12%) and women (50.57%). Involuntary exams for children were more likely to be for girls (55.39%) than boys (44.19%).



Repeated Involuntary Exams



Information about repeated involuntary exams during FY 2019-2020 is shown in Table 5a (all ages), Table 5b (adults), and Table 5c (children). This includes counts of involuntary exams and counts of people. Note that some people may be counted in both Tables 5b and 5c if they had at least one involuntary exam during the year before turning 18 and at least one involuntary exam during the year after they turned 18. Information about additional nuances to reading tables about repeated involuntary exams is in Appendix A of this report.

<u>All Ages</u>: Almost three quarters (74.58%) of people with an involuntary exam in FY 2019-2020 had one exam. This means that one quarter (25.42%) had more than one involuntary exam during the year. The percentage of people with multiple involuntary exams is shown in Table 5a.

People with multiple involuntary exams account for a disproportionate number of exams. For example, the 74.58% of people with one involuntary exam accounted for 47.31% of the involuntary exams. Conversely, the 25.42% of people with two or more involuntary exams accounted for 52.61% of the involuntary exams for the year.

Counts of people with 20 or more involuntary exams during the year are grouped together to redact for cell sizes lower than 10.

<u>Adults</u>: Almost three quarters (74.03%) of people with an involuntary exam in FY 2019-2020 had one exam. This means that one quarter (25.97%) had more than one involuntary exam during the year. The percentage of adults with multiple involuntary exams is shown in Table 5b.

Adults with multiple involuntary exams account for a disproportionate number of exams. For example, the 74.03% of adults with one involuntary exam accounted for 46.23% of the involuntary exams for adults. Conversely, the 25.97% of people with two or more involuntary exams accounted for 53.77% of the involuntary exams for the year.

Counts of exams for adults with 20 or more involuntary exams during the year are grouped together to redact for cell sizes lower than 10.

<u>Children</u>: Three quarters (76.03%) of children with an involuntary exam in FY 2019-2020 had one exam. This means that almost one quarter (23.97%) had more than one involuntary exam during the year. The percentage of children with multiple involuntary exams is shown in Table 5c.

Children with multiple involuntary exams account for a disproportionate number of exams. For example, the 76.03% of children with one involuntary exam accounted for 51.06% of the involuntary exams. Conversely, the 23.7% of people with two or more involuntary exams accounted for 48.94% of the involuntary exams for the year.



C. Change Over Time

Counts of involuntary exams by month for all ages, adults, and children (< 18) are shown in Figure 6a. There is a noticeable decrease of involuntary exams at the beginning in Spring 2020, which is attributed to pandemic-related factors.



Seasonality

The next three figures allow for the comparison of months over multiple years. There is seasonality in the data that takes the form of counts of involuntary exams decreasing during certain months. This is most noticeable in the counts of involuntary exams for children, which are fewer in months during which school is not in session (winter break, spring break, and summer). Counts across months can be compared for all ages (Figure 6b), adults (Figure 6c) and children (Figure 6d). Please note that the scale (veritcal axis) varies for the next three figures. The scale for each axis was selected to show the pattern, but caution needs to be taken if comparing the relative counts across figures.

Figure 6b: Involuntary Exams Comparing Months Across Years: All Ages




Figure 6c: Involuntary Exams Comparing Months Across Years: Adults (18+)






Figure 6d: Involuntary Exams Comparing Months Across Years: Children (< 18)



D. Geographic Area Reporting

Table 6 categorizes involuntary exams by Department region⁴, Managing Entity,⁵ judicial circuit⁶, and county of residence. Caution should be applied when interpreting changes for counties with smaller populations and fewer involuntary exams.⁷ Some geographic areas are categorized in this section as "not known." This is because some forms are received with no county of residence written on the Cover Sheet (form CF-MH3118). E. Receiving Facility Level Reporting

Counts of involuntary exams in Fiscal Year (FY) 2018-2019 and Fiscal Year (FY) 2019-2020 for each receiving facility are shown here. Receiving facilities are listed by the Department region, then alphabetically by facility county within each Department region, then in descending order by number of involuntary exams. The corresponding Managing Entities are also included. The Managing Entities contract with behavioral health providers, including designated receiving facilities, to provide behavioral health services. Also reported is the percent change in involuntary exams from FY 2018-2019 to FY 2019-2020.

There are several reasons why the number of involuntary exams at a receiving facility increase or decrease over time. Change over time in the use of Baker Act exam is a complex issue. Those wanting to make conclusions about this change over time are encouraged to contact the Department to discuss possible factors related to change over time (HQW.SAMH@MyFLFamilies.com).

A total row is provided in Table 7 for each of the Department's regions. It is also important to understand that Table 7 is the only presentation of counts by region that relies on the county of the receiving facility. The rest of this report uses the county of residence to categorize by county. County categorizations are then used to group within the Department's regions, Judicial Circuits, and Managing Entity areas. This is why the counts by the Department's region are slightly different in Table 6 and Table 7.



<u>Public and Private Baker Act Receiving Facilities</u>: The distribution of involuntary exams at public and private receiving facilities is shown in Figure 7. "Public" in this context means the receiving facility received funds from the Department for Baker Act exam related services. These public facilities are under contract with a Managing Entity. Public receiving facilities may also receive funding through Medicaid, private insurance, or county governments. "Private" receiving facilities did not receive funds from the Department and most are not under contact with a Managing Entity.

Children (61.26%) are more likely to have involuntary exams conducted at public receiving facilities as compared to young adults (18-24) (public = 48.69%), adults 25-64 (public = 43.79%), and older adults (65+) (public = 23.58%). The meaningful percentage of involuntary exams conducted at privately funded receiving facilities means that funding and policy, as it relates to both types of receiving facilities, are essential to understand the use of involuntary exams.

F. Involuntary Exams by Initiating Law Enforcement Agency

Counts of involuntary exam per law enforcement agencies (Table 8a) and law enforcement agencies that are part of universities or school districts (Table 8b) are on the following pages. Almost all (95%), 354 out of 372 law enforcement agencies in Florida, had officers who initiated involuntary exams in FY 2019-2020. Law enforcement may also be involved in the transport of people with involuntary exams initiated via a health professional or ex-parte order. Law enforcement agencies are listed alphabetically by county of the agency and then within each county in descending order by agency. Cell sizes smaller than 10 were redacted to protect individuals' privacy.

In order to redact small cell sizes, counts of involuntary exams initiated by law enforcement agencies with fewer than 10 involuntary exams in FY 2019-2020 were grouped together to arrive at a total larger than 10. For example, for Alachua County High Springs Police Department, Alachua County Public School Police Department and Santa Fe College Police Department, each initiated fewer than 10 involuntary exams in FY 2019-2020. These three agencies combined initiated 20 involuntary exams in FY 2019-2020.

The majority of Wakulla County residents who received an involuntary exam were seen at Apalachee Center (45.42%), Tallahassee Memorial Hospital (28.69%), Capital Regional Medical Center (13.94%), and Eastside Psychiatric Hospital (7.97%).

Physicians (who are not Psychiatrists) (43.16%) were the most common health professionals to initiate involuntary exams, followed by Psychiatrists (31.58%), Clinical Social Workers (14.74%), Psychiatric Nurses (5.26%), Mental Health Counselors (3.16%), Physician's Assistants (2.11%), multiple professional types entered (<1%), Clinical Psychologists (<1%), and Marriage and Family Therapists (<1%). A professional type was not reported for <1%.

County: Walton

This county page can be compared to the counts in the <u>Florida Statewide Totals on page 50</u>. Walton County is in the Department's Northwest region and Florida Judicial Circuit 1. NWF Health Network is the Managing Entity for Walton County. In Fiscal Year 2019-2020, there were 323 involuntary exams for 70,567 residents of Walton County.



Part I: Involuntary Exam Level Analyses:

The majority of Walton County residents who received an involuntary exam were seen at Fort Walton Beach Medical Center (76.47%), Baptist Hospital (8.98%), and Emerald Coast Behavioral Hospital (6.50%).

Physicians (who are not Psychiatrists) (71.91%) were the most common health professionals to initiate involuntary exams, followed by Mental Health Counselors (11.80%), Psychiatric Nurses (3.93%), Physician's Assistants (2.81%), Psychiatrists (2.25%), Clinical Social Workers (1.69%), Marriage and Family Therapists (1.12%), multiple professional types entered (1.12%), and Clinical Psychologists (<1%). A professional type was not reported for 3.37%.

NWF Health Network is the Managing Entity for Washington County. In Fiscal Year 2019-2020, there were 126 involuntary exams for 25,344 residents of Washington County.



Part I: Involuntary Exam Level Analyses:

The majority of Washington County residents who received an involuntary exam were seen at Emerald Coast Behavioral Hospital (42.06%), Life Management Center of Northwest Florida (27.78%), and Fort Walton Beach Medical Center (11.11%).

Physicians (who are not Psychiatrists) (52.08%) were the most common health professionals to initiate involuntary exams, followed by Mental Health Counselors (41.67%), Psychiatric Nurses (2.08%), Psychiatrists (2.08%), multiple professional types entered (<1%), Physician's Assistants (<1%), Clinical Psychologists (<1%), Marriage and Family Therapists (<1%), and Clinical Social Workers (<1%). A professional type was not reported for 2.08%.

IV. Appendices

Appendix A: Additional Technical Notes

The Baker Act data analyzed for this report are from involuntary exam forms received by the Baker Act Reporting Center. Some individuals for whom forms were received were never admitted to the receiving facility because an exam by a physician or psychologist performed prior to admission determined they did not meet admission criteria. The data also do not include information on what occurred after the initial exam. For example, the data do not reveal how long individuals stayed at the facility, whether they remained on an involuntary or voluntary basis, or whether the involuntary (Baker Act) exam was converted to a Marchman Act assessment. Because not everyone who has an involuntary exam initiated is admitted to a Baker Act receiving facility, the data in this report are of *involuntary exams*, not admissions data or not counts of *voluntary* exams.

<u>Redaction</u>: **Small cell sizes were redacted from this report**. This redaction is done to prevent identification of people. Those interested in more information about the Baker Act Reporting Center's approach to redaction may contact Annette Christy, Center Director at achristy@usf.edu.

<u>Counts of Involuntary Exams vs. Counts of People</u>: This report includes both counts of involuntary exams (Section III) and counts of people who received involuntary exams (Section IV). These categories were reported separately to avoid confusion. Those who write about the findings of this report are cautioned to be careful to not confuse counts of involuntary exams with counts of people who received involuntary exams. Center Director, Annette Christy, may be contacted to clarify as needed at achristy@usf.edu.

Percent Change: Percent change is reported throughout this report. This is a helpful metric that can put counts of involuntary exams into context. However, certain issues with using percent change need to be considered. Percent change needs to be interpreted carefully when the change is between small numbers. For example, an increase in County A from 4 to 8 is a 100% increase, just as a change in County B from 1,000 to 2,000 is a 100% increase. The challenge is to interpret what importance should be given to this percent change when determining whether there is a problem to be addressed and how to address it. What these counts represent out of the total population needs to also be considered. For example, County A has a population of 50,000. Four equals a rate of 8 per 100,000, while 8 equals a rate of 16 per 100,000 for County A. County B has a population of 500,000. This means that 1,000 equals a rate of 200 per 100,000 and 2,000 equals a rate of 400 per 100,000. The rate in County B is much higher than the rate in County A even though the percent increase is the same. Some counties may have large percentages of change, but because their counts were low in relation to other counties to begin with, the increase over time may still mean that their rate per 100,000 is still smaller relative to other counties.

Context Matters: What is being measured matters. Let's say it is readmissions to a state hospital over a three-year period that is being measured. An increase from 8 to 16 may have meaning. But if we are measuring, for example, deaths by suicide for 12 to 14-year-old youth, this same 100% increase from 8 to 16 may be meaningful in a different way, and perhaps more concerning. What is occurring at the state level and in the community of focus as it relates to what is being measured needs to be considered. Was there some sort of catastrophic event, such as a hurricane or a severe economic downturn? How do the characteristics of the community of focus impact what is being measured, and perhaps in a different way to other communities to which a comparison is being drawn. Is access to service different between the two communities being compared, such as access to Baker Act receiving facilities? The point here is that the percent change is just a number. Figuring out what it means and how to compare it between communities requires learning more about those communities. The numbers in this report are only a start to understanding relevant issues.

There are complex reasons for the lower numbers of involuntary exams in some areas and higher numbers in other areas. Readers of this report are urged to consider these factors when interpreting the results. For example, the distribution of Baker Act receiving facilities statewide is not uniform. About half of Florida's 67 counties have at least one Baker Act receiving facility and the others do not have any. Areas of some counties are geographically distant from the nearest receiving facility. Additional factors may influence the use of involuntary exams, such as:

- Number of people trained in Mental Health First Aid;
- Law enforcement training, including Crisis Intervention Training (CIT);
- Availability of criminal justice system diversion programs at all sequential intercepts, including those funded by Criminal Justice, Mental Health, and Substance Abuse (CJMHSA) Reinvestment Grants;
- Availability and quality of community-based behavioral health services, including Mobile Response Teams (MRTs), Florida Assertive Community Treatment (FACT) and Community Action Treatment (CAT) Teams;
- Availability of a wide array of social services, such as assistance with housing, coverage for health care, and existence of county funds for those who are underinsured or uninsured; and
- How facilities approach the admission status (voluntary or involuntary) for children based on the logistics of holding the required voluntariness hearing for children.

<u>Terminology:</u> Involuntary exams occur at designated *receiving facilities*. Receiving facilities may include hospitals (licensed under Chapter 395, F.S.) and Crisis Stabilization Units (licensed under Chapter 394, F.S.). The Department designates all Baker Act receiving facilities regardless of type. Some receiving facilities are called Crisis Stabilization Units (CSUs). CSUs are usually residential units of community mental health centers and receive Department funds for Baker Act services. CSUs designated for children are referred to as Children's Crisis Stabilization Units (CCSUs). This means that while all CSUs/CCSUs are Baker Act receiving facilities, not all Baker Act receiving facilities are CSUs. The abbreviations CSU and CCSU are used throughout this report. Receiving facilities that are provided funds from the Department are referred to later in this report as "public," while those not receiving such funds are referred to as "private."

<u>Unknown/Not Reported Values</u>: The age necessary for analyses by age groups is computed by subtracting the person's date of birth as reported on the Cover Sheet (form CF-MH3118) from the date of exam initiation on the law enforcement initiation form, professional certificate or ex-parte order. Age cannot be determined and is reported as "unknown" if the date of birth is not provided or if it is not legible. The county of residence reported on the Cover Sheet is used to categorize involuntary exams geographically, such as by Department Region, Managing Entity area, and Judicial Circuity. The "not reported" category for presentation of information by geographic areas means that the county of residence was not reported on the Cover Sheet.

<u>Population Statistics</u>: Population statistics are provided in some tables to put counts of involuntary exams in context. Population estimates were obtained from the Florida Office of Economic and Demographic Research. County level characteristics were obtained from the Florida Department of Health, Division of Public Health Statistics and Performance Management, and Florida Health Charts. While this report focuses on counts by fiscal years, estimates of population are available by calendar year. Logical calendar year spans are used to provide context.

<u>Unique Person Identifier</u>: A unique person identifier was created using available data. Social security number could have been used as a unique identifier if the data were complete enough for this purpose. The Cover Sheet (form CF-MH3118) requires reporting of the full social security number. However, the percentage of missing social security numbers precluded researchers from using it as a unique person identifier.

Link King software was used to identify individuals and create a unique id using both deterministic and probabilistic matching algorithms. The probabilistic algorithms used by Link King were developed by MEDSTAT for the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Administration's (SAMHSA) Integrated database project. The program is capable of recognizing use of nicknames, hyphenated names, misspelled names, transposed social security number digits, and transposed date fields. A minimum of first name, last name, and either date of birth or social security number is required for matching. There were only 463 records of involuntary exams in Fiscal Year 2019-2020 that did not have the minimum information for matching. Uncertain matches and a sample of successfully matched records were manually reviewed for accuracy.

Counting Repeated Involuntary Exams: The Unique Person Identifier was used to count repeated involuntary exams. The count of repeated involuntary exams is provided for adults and children in the county tables and for all ages, adults and children earlier in the report at the statewide level. Involuntary exams for which age is not known cannot be included in tables that report results for adults and children because the age is necessary to categorize people into age groups. Also, people who have at least one exam as a child and one as an adult during the year were counted in both the adult and child tables. For example, a person who during the year had two involuntary exams when they were 17, and one after they turned 18 would count as one person with three involuntary exams in the all ages table, as one adult with two exams in the adult table, and one child with one exam in the child table. For these reasons, the counts of people and exams in the tables counting repeated exams do not add up to the total of people and exams earlier in the report. The counts of people for all ages also varies slightly from the combined counts of adults and children. These differences are small and do not impact the overall meaning of the results.

To look at repeated involuntary exams for adults, first the number of adults with one exam is counted, two exams, three exams, and so forth on up to the person with the most exams in the year. Counts of the number of exams in a year is in Column number one below. Grouping numbers of exams into categories at higher numbers of exams (such as 6-10, and 11+) to avoid reporting of small cell sizes was then done. For example, 76,186 adults (column 2) accounting for 74.03% of adults with involuntary exams in Fiscal Year 2019-2020 (column 3) had one involuntary exam, 14,810 (column 1) had two involuntary exams accounting for 14.29% of people with involuntary exams (column 3) and so forth.

The number reported in columns 4 and 5 allow the percentage of exams out of the total number of exams that people with various numbers of involuntary exams account for during Fiscal Year 2019-2020 to be seen. For example, while the 649 adults with 11 or more involuntary exams accounted for less than 1% of adults with an involuntary exam, their exams accounted for 6.47% of the total adults for exams for the year.

Appendix C: Mobile Response Teams

The Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School Public Safety Act, Ch. 2018-3, Laws of Florida, created a statewide network of Mobile Response Teams (MRTs). In 2020, House Bill 945 amended section 394.495, Florida Statutes, to include MRT in the child and adolescent array of services, outline programmatic requirements, and expand MRT eligibility to include children that are served by the child welfare system and are experiencing or at risk of experiencing placement instability. MRTs provide readily available crisis care in the community and increase opportunities to stabilize individuals in the least restrictive setting to avoid the need for hospital or emergency department utilization. The Managing Entities contract with providers for MRTs, with statewide access to this service. There are currently 39 MRTs, a list of which can be accessed at https://www.MyFlFamilies.com/service-programs/samh/treatment-maps.shtml. Statewide MRT data for Fiscal Year 2019-2020 provided by the Department is shown in Figure C.

The goals of MRTs are to lessen trauma; conduct an independent assessment to determine if the individual may be safely diverted from emergency departments; prevent unnecessary psychiatric hospitalization; or divert from juvenile justice or criminal justice settings. Mobile response services are available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, 365 days a year. Services are provided by a team of licensed professionals, master's level professionals, and paraprofessionals trained in crisis intervention skills. In addition to helping resolve the crisis, MRTs work with individuals and families to identify resources, provide linkages, and develop strategies for effectively dealing with potential future crises.

Intervention is warranted when a crisis interferes with the ability to function and places the individual at risk of self-harm, harm to others, or disruption of services or living environment. The individual may present with an overt change in functioning or have difficulty coping with traumatic life events. Mobile Response Teams may coordinate in-person services with law enforcement to provide additional safety, when appropriate and necessary.

MRTs provide immediate, onsite behavioral health crisis services at minimum to people who are 25 and younger who:

- 1. Have an emotional disturbance; or
- 2. Are experiencing a mental health or emotional crisis; or
- 3. Are experiencing escalating emotional or behavioral health reactions and symptoms that impact their ability to function typically within the family, living situation, or community environment; or,
- 4. Are served by the child welfare system and are experiencing or at high risk of placement instability.

Data provided by the Managing Entities to the Department were used for information presented in Figure C.
