Marisol and Marvella have shared the responsibility of living with our residential HEP students, who reside on campus for the duration of their session. Living on campus is a unique opportunity, but it can also make students and parents quite nervous. Marvella understands this perfectly, because that is exactly what happened to her when she was coming to USF: "When I told my parents I would live on campus to attend school, they were worried since I had never been away from home...When it came closer to move-in day, I felt more nervous but excited at the same time because I was ready to begin a new journey." Marisol agrees, "It was an adjustment being far away from home, and I felt homesick at times, but I also found a new sense of freedom and responsibility." Marvella adds on, "I had to adjust to many things such as living on campus with someone I did not know, managing my time better, and doing my work without having to be reminded to do it like in high school. I quickly learned to do so and it helped me do good in my classes." Marisol and Marvella are excellent role models for our HEP The voung counselors understand the importance of learning how to balance personal, social, and school life.

Marvella: "Being a residential counselor has benefited me in many ways such as acquiring skills that have helped me manage my schedule and work with the HEP students while still being in school. I learned to listen and understand the students and advise them the best I could. I have also gained their trust and respect, which made it easier to work with them and help them as much as could. Working with HEP students was challenging at times, but nothing I couldn't handle. This position not only got me out of my comfort, but it also

taught me to not be afraid of trying new things, which could assist me in acquiring additional skills. I would definitely say that my most memorable experience while working in the dorms with the HEP students would be being a role model to them and building a strong relationship with them. It has been a great experience and very much interesting these past two years."

Marisol: "Working as a residential counselor has allowed me to attend classes, do homework during the day. and assist the HEP students with homework in the afternoons and evenings. I would take the students to campus events, and we would do activities on the weekends like playing board games, kayaking, going to the mall, or going to the movies. When I wasn't busy with the students, I would study. Working for HEP has been a blessing. I have learned so much about myself and what I am capable of by taking on this responsibility. I have met some amazing students that have come through the program, and I am glad I was a part of their experience in pursuing their GED. From trips to Walmart, and the hours we spent talking in the dorm, to heated games of UNO, it was all memorable."

Marisol and Marvella also had some tips for those coming after them. Marisol advises the next HEP counselors to "be patient, be fair, take charge, and make sure to have fun." Marvella's words for the future CAMP and HEP students: "work ahead on assignments, go to office hours, and do not be afraid to join clubs or organizations, and, lastly, do not let anything stop you from achieving your goals because anything is possible with the support of family, friends, and HEP & CAMP!"

# **Bulls Service Break:**

## CAMP Students Volunteer for Habitat for Humanity

Bulls Service Breaks are spring break programs led by the USF Center for Leadership and Civic Engagement, created to increase awareness of social injustice and encourage cultural exchange. Bulls Service Breaks highlight problems in the community while showing students what can be done to improve the environment.

Volunteers are partnered with local organizations to get hands-on experience with social causes. CAMP sponsored students to participate in the program this spring. Below they share their reflections on the experience.





This year, CAMP students traveled to South Carolina to volunteer for Habitat for Humanity. When asked about their trip, Emanuel said, "There were many things that I took away from this experience, but the biggest takeaways were the work ethic, the people I met while serving, and getting closer to those in my CAMP cohort. I learned from this trip how the volunteering experience on a wider scale works and how intertwined the community can be to get something done. The experience was lifechanging and great."

The students learned and appreciated the work of Habitat for Humanity. In Karina's words, "I learned about all the hard work that goes into making homes for families and improving housing affordability." Daniela, said, "I was able to see how Habitat for Humanity empowers families in need and works day by day to work towards affordable housing. My experience volunteering was very heartwarming and eye-opening." For Berenice, "Just hearing how thankful they were and how everyone who serves Habitat for Humanity has changed their lives for the better, made me feel happy for them and even more blessed for saying yes to this opportunity."

Bulls Service Break gave our students specific work-related insights and taught them valuable skills. In Daniela's words, "As a social work major, my ultimate goal is to help out individuals and families in need of social services, and it was an excellent opportunity to do this during my BSB service... [This experience] motivated me to advocate for those in vulnerable communities and one day be able to work in an amazing organization like Habitat for Humanity." Eduardo said, "I learned how to do some roof repairs.... I also learned that collaboration is important because it allows you to work in a team environment effectively."

Grizelda shared, "I partook in replacing the old skirt of the house, measuring and cutting with an electrical saw...We worked on landscaping, digging, and breaking the ground with shovels." Grizelda appreciates that she could potentially use those skills at her own home. For her part, Berenice recalled, "We were welcomed into the Restore, a reuse store that allowed us to see all the donations of furniture the community made. I loved helping re-paint chairs and tables to prepare them for sale. A staff member told us to get creative...", and the students certainly did.

In addition to such valuable lessons, Angel enjoyed the traveling: "I was looking forward to this type of experience since I rarely left the state for anything other than work.... I have never felt the Atlantic Ocean and had only gone to beaches that touch the Gulf of Mexico." Angel hoped others can participate in the experience and learn as much as he did.









## Staff Recognition:

Malcolm Randolph has contributed significantly to the success of Hispanic students at USF through his dedication and support of the College Assistance Migrant Program (CAMP). In particular, his efforts have assisted program staff in exceeding yearly enrollment goals and providing the opportunity of a USF education for Hispanic students from hard to reach, remote areas of the state.



In support of these efforts, Malcolm has personally welcomed to the university visiting migrant students, parents, and staff from throughout the state, including from his home town of Belle Glade. Malcolm's welcoming and caring demeanor, as well as his ability to relate to migrant students and their families by sharing his personal story, has created a pipeline of students who see themselves as potential USF Bulls.

Mr. Randolph communicates regularly with the CAMP recruiter to review the status of each USF applicant. He often advocates for admitting students who otherwise might not be offered admission into USF, knowing that with extra support from CAMP they can make a successful transition into USF and meet their academic goals. He also serves on the USF Center for Migrant Education Management Team, providing admissions and other data for required reports and offering suggestions on how to enhance recruitment efforts for this specific population made up primarily of Latinx students. Malcolm has facilitated access to training for CAMP ambassadors consisting of upper-level USF students (often CAMP alumni) who volunteer on student panels and conduct bilingual campus tours for visiting students and parents.


## DREAM TO STUDY ABROAD:
