Mr. Dario E. Teicher is a Senior Defense Analyst, specializing in Countering Weapons of Mass Destruction – Arms Control, at U.S. Central Command. He holds a B.S. in Computer Science from the State University of New York, Maritime College, a Master of Science in Telecommunications from the Naval Postgraduate School and is a graduate from the U.S. Army Command and General Staff College, the Joint Forces Staff College, and the U.S. Air Force Air War College where he received a Master of Strategic Studies degree.

Prior to his retirement from the U. S. Navy, Mr. Teicher was a resident professor at the U.S. Naval War College in the Joint Military Operations Department. He was also a Surface Warfare Officer, a Joint Specialty Officer, and a Foreign Area Officer (Western Hemisphere). He served as the Naval Section Chief for the U.S. Military Group, El Salvador and as the Chief of Security Cooperation Plans for U. S. Southern Command, where he supported Colombia's military offensive against narco-terrorism and other security cooperation activities throughout the region.
