GREETINGS FROM THE DIRECTOR

Hello from SSS!

The TRIO Student Support Services (SSS) team continues to enjoy our work in helping students succeed at USF. Since the publishing of our last newsletter, we have welcomed 2 new team members and you will meet them in this newsletter edition as part of our Meet the SSS Staff feature. I appreciate the continued support of SSS from Dean Allison Crume and Assistant Dean Tony Delgado of Undergraduate Studies during this exciting time. The SSS team remains focused on ensuring the continued success of SSS students as we meet our grant funded objectives and contribute to the strategic mission of USF. Thus,



I am happy to share that we have again exceeded our funding objectives in our most recent Annual Performance Report (APR) submitted to our funding source, the U.S. Department of Education. For the 2021-2022 academic year, data from the APR show SSS achieved a slight increase in persistence rate to 98% and a strong 92% good academic standing rate among served students. The SSS 6-year graduation rate also significantly increased to 70%, which reflects a positive impact of moving to a new 4-year model of serving students through graduation. We moved to this new model in 2020 in order to maintain our student support from their transition into USF during our summer bridge program all the way through to their graduation from USF. While our new model has positively impacted some metrics, it also necessitated a move to admit fewer students into SSS at USF in order to serve participants for a longer period. Consequently, in the coming year I hope to engage in further conversation about how the SSS model might be formally expanded at USF to serve more students from first-generation and low-income backgrounds. Let's build on our success!

In addition, new SSS initiatives began this year – including partnering with the Office of Multicultural Affairs to celebrate the inaugural First Generation Day at USF for first generation college students, faculty, and staff to network and engage in resource sharing. SSS also enjoyed enhanced collaboration with the New Bulls Scholars program, ACE, and Student Athletics in helping our respective student populations acclimate to USF, network with their peers, and receive motivational words of encouragement. Newer initiatives such as the SSS Connects Live sessions held on MS Teams for newly admitted students and the SSS Canvas page to help newly admitted students complete their onboarding requirements also continue to be successful in helping SSS reach its goals.

Thank you to our campus partners who provide support to the success of SSS students. We are happy to work with partners who provide SSS students with key resources such as scholarships, employment, internships, mentorships, and information about college success. Please feel free to contact me with new ideas of how we can be partners in student success!

In this newsletter, I am delighted to share stories of student success and program updates — you will meet outstanding SSS students who are making a positive impact on the USF campus and in the surrounding community, participating in internship and study abroad opportunities, and hear the voices of students as they reflect on their SSS experience. With the help of our USF community, we can continue providing students from diverse backgrounds with a positive college experience and a sense of belonging at USF. I remain optimistic that we will continue to build on our legacy of inclusive excellence by ensuring all students reach their personal, academic, and career goals — we are deeply committed to this goal and hope you will join us on the journey. As you read our newsletter, I invite you to celebrate the success of SSS students at USF — GO BULLS!

Student Spotlight: Jaelyn Wise

Congratulations to Jaelyn Wise for being an outstanding SSS student – we are so proud of all that you have accomplished and look forward to seeing your next chapter at USF!

SSS Senior student Jaelyn Wise from Sanford, Florida, is featured as this year's outstanding student. Jaelyn graduated spring 2023 with a B.S. in Public Health and plans to attend graduate school in the fall semester. Jaelyn plans to remain at USF and enroll in the Curriculum and Instruction Master's program with a concentration in Student Affairs while also working full-time in the SSS office as a Counselor/Advisor to incoming first generation and/or low-income students. Jaelyn says "Upon graduating from the CSA program I plan to get my Doctorate degree. Then I'd like to start my own first generation and/or low-income college support program for high school and/or college students in my hometown, as many people from my area do not get the opportunity to attend or graduate from college." Jaelyn is very proud to graduate from USF in 3 years with zero debt with close guidance from SSS Director, Dr. LaTosha Thomas who Jaelyn believes is "the glue that continues to help this program grow and flourish on the USF campus."

Jaelyn credits the SSS program as the reason for attending USF because the financial aid package she received paid for the cost to attend the summer program. She learned from Shamease Cooper, a former SSS student and Peer Coach that the program supports its students in a caring family atmosphere, which was important to her given the large size of USF. Jaelyn says Cooper not only shared the benefits of the program and connected her to SSS, but also became "a mentor to me and a big reason on how I knew how much SSS was going to change my life for the better." In her spare time Jaelyn enjoys being with family and friends, watching TV, and reading self-enrichment books to become the best version of herself. Jaelyn is dedicated to helping others as can be witnessed through her love of community service, student success, and student organizations such as Students Striving to be Successful Vice President (S-Club), Sisters Inspiring Success (SIS), National Council of



Negro Women (NCNW), Blackish in Public Health, and Black Student Union. A hard worker, Jaelyn was employed with SSS as the Summer Program Assistant and as a Peer Coach. Working in these roles helped Jaelyn solidify her career choice and enhanced her desire to work in higher education. Jaelyn also served as a Teacher Assistant for the Academic Foundations Seminar course and interned for Planned Parenthood while completing her undergraduate degree. In addition, Jaelyn volunteered with Rebuilding Tampa Bay where she conducted home assessments and identified and taught residents how to reduce and remove asthma triggers. Jaelyn clearly believes in working hard while also giving back to the community and helping others. Jaelyn says, "SSS has helped me achieve success in so many ways from breaking out of my shell during COVID, being able to graduate in less than 3 years, getting involved and active within the USF community, and helping me find my job of passion when I had to change majors. SSS was there for me through all my highs, lows, and in-betweens serving as a bridge to help me get to where I am today."

SSS Encourages High Impact Practices: Study Abroad



Study abroad programs provide a great opportunity for students to study in locations around the world, expand their world view, learn a different language, and immerse in a new culture. SSS senior student Zaynab Ali-Salahuddin, traveled to South Africa and enrolled in the 'Seasons of Protest' course, which examined the history of protests in South Africa and the United States. Zaynab says her academic expectations were exceeded by the program and excitedly shared these words "Thank you South Africa for the experience of a lifetime!"

She further explained, the course provided a synopsis of approaches to protest and social movement and "Rigorously analyzed the United States Civil Rights movements of the 1960s, the international antiapartheid movement, #RhodesMustFall, #FeesMustFall, and the #BlackLivesMatter campaign. We broke down some of the key debates in sociology, anthropology, and political science that pertains to forms of resistance. The course explored various texts and included various excursions including the Slave Lodge in South Africa, Muizenberg Beach, and a South African Broadway-like play. While abroad, my outlook on life pivoted. Studying


abroad really allowed me time to slow things down in my life as I was once rushing through before with zero direction. I learned to embrace others and not always judge others by what they may have or how they look because we all hold a story, and that story is part of the human's journey. My goals used to be marked by material items, but that is no longer because, in the end, those things have done nothing to improve the quality of life for human beings on this planet. I realized that it is up to us to save humanity through generosity, compassion, and sensitivity. As I move closer to graduating in Spring 2023, I am preparing for my next journey of life which will hopefully be graduate school."

Zaynab says the people of South Africa were welcoming and the cuisine was fresh and rich in flavor. She describes her experience in this way "Living and studying abroad was scary at first but the people around me and in my program made me feel comfortable."

SSS senior student and Psychology major Yelianys Remedio participated in the education abroad program and traveled to Florence, Italy with the help of the Benjamin A. Gilman Scholarship. Yelianys chose the USF in Florence Psych/Social Behavioral Science Program and states "It was a dream come true". She attended classes at Florence University of the Arts (FUA) and explored places like Lake Como (the third largest Italian lake) and the Amalfi Coast. She also experienced a gondola ride in Venice, shopped in Milan, and visited the Colosseum and Trevi Foutain in Rome. Yelianys states "One of my dreams was to study abroad and thanks to the Gilman Scholarship I was able to do just that and in my dream destination. Student Success: Internships

SSS encourages its students to seek out and engage in high impact practices for college success. Internships are one such experience that can enhance student success and help students gain first-hand work experience. Internships are beneficial opportunities which provide students with skills, information, and connections that will help them become more marketable in the workforce. Here are two examples of the internships that SSS students have completed recently.

National Migrant and Seasonal Head Start Association



Alma Hernandez a junior SSS student, interned the summer of 2022 in Washington, DC with the Child Labor Coalition through an internship program organized by the National Migrant and Seasonal Head Start Association (NMSHSA). Alma who is from Plant City, Florida, is also a participant the College Assistance Migrant Program (CAMP) at USF. CAMP is designed to assist eligible participants from migrant and seasonal farmworker backgrounds in completing their first year of college and transitioning to complete their bachelor's degree.

Alma's duties while interning included writing emails to officials for their support and retweeting any posts relevant to the Child Labor Coalition. The internship program is offered to college students from around the country who participated in a Migrant &


