To kick off the Fall 2009 semester on Monday August 31, we had the privilege to host the PEW Project on National Security, Energy and Climate featuring former US. Senators John Warner (R-Virginia) and Bob Graham (D-Florida); Vice Admiral Dennis McGinn, USN (Ret.), and University of South Florida Professor Thomas Crisman of the Patel Center for Global Solutions. This forum is part of a national series of discussions organized by PEW which brings leading national political, military and academic thinkers together in a call for action. They addressed the issue of global climate change from the perspective that tensions between people and nations will rise as climate change induced natural disasters bring about food shortages and increase competition for natural resources.

A standing room only crowd heard each of the distinguished speakers give a short presentation followed by a question and answer period. The bottom line message of the national tour is that America cannot do nothing but must step out and lead.

JMLC in Action

The University of South Florida Army, Naval and Air Force ROTC programs and the Joint Military Leadership Center (JMLC) have now entered their third year inside the walls of C.W. Bill Young Hall. Since moving into this premier “state of the art” facility and as news about the uniqueness of ROTC at the University of South Florida’s gets out both in and outside of the university, we have the privilege to host many diverse events and visitors that have a direct impact on global and national security issues.



The JMLC for the first time partnered with the University Lecture Series to sponsor retired Foreign Service Officer and former Iran hostage, Ambassador John Limbert on October 6 in the Marshall Center Theater. Ambassador Limbert is an expert on Iran and has written extensively on the country, its people and culture. During his presentation, he discussed the state of conflict between Iran and the United States since the US Embassy takeover by Iranian students in November 1979. This lecture was very timely considering the present state of affairs with the country of Iran and was attended by a diverse group of university students including ROTC, faculty, staff and other college professors.

The JMLC sponsored Mr. Frank Wuco, a retired U.S. Navy Commander and Intelligence Officer, to speak to the Air Force and Naval ROTC Leadership Labs on Thursday, September 24. Mr. Wuco is an expert on Radical Islam and Jihad. He assists U.S. Central Command in training personnel to better understand the nature of the enemy in the Global War on Terror and is President of Red Mind Solutions. In his presentation to the ROTC students, Wuco role played a radical Muslim and interacted with the audience so everyone can better understand the philosophy and thinking of a radical Muslim and the call to Jihad.



On Friday, 25 September, a total of 30 Army, Naval and Air Force ROTC students visited the U.S. Special Operations Command (USSOCOM) headquarters at MacDill AFB. The students received a command brief by Colonel James Sculerati, USAF which provided an overview of USSOCOM’s mission, organization and how it interacts with other joint and service commands. The students were then given an opportunity to visit the Special Operations Memorial just outside the headquarters building where all Soldiers, Marines, Sailors, and Airmen of the Special Operations forces who have died in combat are recognized for their ultimate sacrifice. The students then visited the Special Operations Rigger Shed to learn about the SOCOM Jump Team and observe the parachute simulator in operation with one of their peers strapped in for a jump. Overall, it was a unique opportunity to visit a Unified Command headquarters and learn more about jointness within our Special Operations Forces.

On Thursday, 19 November, the JMLC hosted a visit sponsored by Training Wing 4, a naval aviation training command based at NAS Corpus Christi. Training Wing 4 is responsible for primary and advanced joint pilot training in the T-34, T-44, and C-12 for Marine, Navy, Air Force and Coast Guard aviators. The visit included both aviation instructors and students from each of these services who gave a variety of presentations on recent experiences including combat operations in Iraq both in the air and on the ground as forward air controllers. A static display of the T-34 and T-44 training aircraft was available for students to visit at Tampa International Airport.





From the “Joint Battlefield...”

When we hear from our ROTC graduates who write to us about some of their joint experiences within their respective services and individual professions, we will share them with you. Recently, we received an email from 1stLt Wes Jagoe, USMC, NROTC Class of 2007, who has recently deployed to Afghanistan as a Platoon Commander. Here is an excerpt from his email discussing some of his joint and multi-national experiences during combat operations in Afghanistan in support of Operation ENDURING FREEDOM.

“...Talk about JOINT, it is pretty purple out here. I had a nice stay at Manas AB in Kyrgyzstan, where I was very impressed with the Air Force. I have flown in some AF aircraft. Where I work there is a good contingent of Airmen as well. The classes we were given when we first arrived (counter insurgency classes) were conducted by a Marine Lt, an Army Sergeant First Class (who could not get the whole “hoorah” thing down), and an Australian Sergeant Major. If you are wounded over here, you can expect Army Blackhawk “Dustoff” units to pick you up and take you to a British/Dutch base to be treated by personnel of every service and every country. Of course there are plenty of Navy around here, I have a Corpsman in my platoon, but I think of him as a Marine...sometimes when I see the Navy nametags I take a second look...forgetting for a minute. We have Marines training the ANA, I have seen Georgians, Croatians, Lithuanians, Germans, British, Australian, Dutch...we are truly a NATO force over here. I haven’t run into any USF folks around here yet.



THE BATTALION IN ACTION

December 12, ten NROTC students commissioned into the United States Navy and Marine Corps as Ensigns and Second Lieutenants. Two students were named honor graduates and presented with a Navy or Marine Corps sword. The first, Katie Borgholthaus, graduated with a degree in criminology with Summa Cume Laude honors. "The program inspired me to push beyond my perceived abilities and achieve more than I ever thought I could," stated Second Lieutenant Borgholthaus, who had also been the "Buccaneer Battalion's" Commanding Officer for the Fall 2009 semester. She will be continuing on to The Basic School (TBS) in Quantico, Virginia with hopes to enter the field of aviation. The second honor graduate, Corianne Norrid, was the unit's first nursing graduate. Ensign Norrid was the Battalion Commanding Officer in Fall 2008 and affirmed, "NROTC really encouraged me to develop a greater level of comfort in both working and personal relationship situations." ENS Norrid will be stationed at Naval Medical Center in San Diego, California.

Among other graduates were prior enlisted members Candie Coleman, Jason Gaskins, Nicolas Devorak, and Steven Lombardo and midshipmen Shaun Geary, Daniel Johnson, Ian Overcash, and Nathan Rice. Second Lieutenants Coleman and Gaskins will be attending TBS in Quantico, Virginia, where they will go through further training and military education to determine their Military Occupational Specialty (MOS). Heading to flight school in Pensacola, Florida are Ensigns Devorak and Rice, where they will be in training as Naval Flight Officers and Naval Aviators, respectively. Ensign Lombardo will be training in Panama City, Florida at the Navy Diving and Salvage Training Center while he works toward a position as a Special Operations Explosive Ordnance Disposal Officer. Future Surface Warfare Officers Ensign Geary, Johnson, and Overcash, will be going directly to their assigned ships for on the job training at sea. Ensign Geary will be stationed on USS Mesa Verde (LPD 19) out of Norfolk, Virginia as the Gunnery Officer. Joining him in Norfolk is ENS Johnson, who will be onboard one of the Navy's newest destroyers, USS Forest Sherman (DDG 98) as the Electronics Warfare Officer. Saying "Aloha" to the mainland, Ensign Overcash will be stationed in Pearl Harbor, Hawaii aboard USS Lake Erie (CG 70).

Think about how easy it is to supply ourselves with items that we need here in the United States via places like Wal-Mart, local convenience stores, or other retail chains. For an overwhelming majority of deployed American forces involved in the ongoing operations in Iraq and Afghanistan, even in the unlikely event that a convenience store is nearby, most would require a combat convoy simply to make the trip. While the brave men and women of our armed forces are in harm's way defending our freedom, many are forced to fight on without the basic necessities we on the home front tend to take for granted. Bob Williams, a Navy veteran, has worked tirelessly to help make the lives of our troops deployed overseas a bit less hectic. Williams, founder of Support the Troops, has established an organization that currently on a weekly basis sends over 200 large boxes of 'care packages' to some 200 combat zone bases from his warehouse in Wesley Chapel, FL. These care packages contain anything from basic hygiene items to snacks and candy to coffee and cigars. The entire operation would never be possible if it were not for generous donations from various companies who have given away countless products for the cause, as well as individuals whose monetary donations help to cover the extremely high cost required to ship these items overseas. The volunteers who pack up all of these items and ship them out are always in high demand and are greatly appreciated. Students from the USF Buccaneer Battalion made two Saturday morning visits to the Support the Troops warehouse throughout the fall 2009 semester, in what will hopefully become a long-standing tradition for the unit.

I do have two cadets that I need to highlight.

Estefania Buritica received the AFROTC Silver Valor award, the second highest honor a cadet can receive. She is a new cadet this fall and received the award for her actions during a campus security incident early in the fall. She was driving one of the campus shuttle buses during the incident, and realized a passenger on the bus was the individual people were looking for. Her calm, deliberate actions helped peacefully resolve the incident without alarming the other passengers. She received the award from the University President during the halftime ceremony of one of USF's home football game.

Evan Mines was one of two AFROTC cadets nationwide to receive the Air Force Association First Command Educational Foundation ROTC Scholarship. This is a \$5000 scholarship awarded to highly qualified AFROTC cadets, coming into their junior or senior year in the fall of 2009 and committed to course of study in science, technology, engineering or math. Cadet Mines is a senior engineering student here at USF. He is also the detachment representative for the annual Marshall-Arnold 5-Star Leadership seminar this spring.

This academic year we are projected to graduate and commission 20 new 2nd Lieutenants into the Air Force. The first three graduated and commissioned in December 2009. Everyone else is scheduled to complete the program in May or August. They will be entering a wide variety of career specialties, including pilot, combat systems officer (formally known as navigator), space and missiles, intelligence, security forces, logistics readiness, acquisitions, public affairs and force support.

As the seniors prepare for the start of their active duty career, the training focus for the rest of the cadet wing shifts to getting our sophomores eligible and ready to attend their summer AFROTC Field Training. Good luck.

It's been another great year for the detachment, but we would not be successful without the outstanding support we receive from the University of South Florida and the leadership of our 14 cross-town colleges and universities. Thank you.

It's an honor to serve along side the Army and Navy ROTC staffs, and the JMLC staff. Together, we conduct what I think is the best university-based commissioning program in the United States.

JOINT LEADERSHIP COMMAND



At the start of the Fall 2009 semester, a new student organization called the Joint Leadership Command was started. The Joint Leadership Command is an innovative senior level ROTC student organization that will empower ROTC students to excel in leadership roles with confidence in a joint and multinational environment. The Mission, Vision and structure of the Joint Leadership Command was developed by Cadet Cameron Vale (Air Force ROTC) and other ROTC student leaders and approved by the service ROTC unit commanders and the Joint Military Leadership Center Executive Director.

The mission of the Joint Leadership Command is to synchronize and coordinate the university's Army, Naval and Air Force ROTC programs and activities in order to facilitate the interaction and promote esprit de corps amongst the cadets, officer candidates and midshipmen. The Joint Leadership Command will provide the ROTC students with leadership opportunities and unique leadership skills while gaining a basic understanding and appreciation of their sister services' capabilities, limitations and cultures.

The command structure of the Joint Leadership Command is similar to that of the Joint Chiefs of Staff and is comprised of a Chairman, Vice Chairman and the Battalion/Wing Commanders of the individual service ROTC programs. The intent is to have this command group meet only as needed to agree upon and schedule various joint activities and events for an academic semester. A support staff presently consists of a J3, Director of Operations, and J4, Director of Logistics. These positions, along with the Chairman and Vice Chairman, will be filled by students from each of the individual ROTC programs and rotate each semester to form a Joint Staff that reports to the Joint Leadership Command. During the Fall 2009 semester, the Joint Leadership Command was led by Chairman, Cadet Cameron Vale (Air Force ROTC) and Vice Chairman, Officer Candidate Christopher Reed (Naval ROTC). Cadet Ben Swan served as the Logistics Director and Cadet Joshua Delosreyes (Army ROTC) served as the Operations Director.

During the Fall 2009 semester, the Joint Leadership Command sponsored, organized and executed the annual Tri-Service ROTC Flag Football tournament and Joint Picnic on Saturday, 10 October. This year's Tri-Service Flag Football Champion is the Air Force ROTC. The Joint Leadership Command also ran a Joint Commissary (or snack/concession stand) in the Joint Student Lounge to provide students an inexpensive and convenient concession of food and beverages to help them get through those long days of study and training during the semester while raising funds to support joint activities.

As this new student organization continues to evolve and mature, we envision the three service ROTC student organizations will interact more with each other both socially and professionally. Plans are already in the works for the Spring 2010 semester to have another joint competitive event/picnic and a Toughest Bull competition. The sky is the limit!





PROGRAM UPDATE

The University of South Florida received a follow on grant of approximately \$60,000 for Academic Year 2009-2010 after last year's initial grant for participation in Project GO. At the University of South Florida, Project GO supports ROTC students studying the Department of Defense critical languages of Arabic, Chinese and Russian.

During this past summer, Cadets Glen Fagan (Army ROTC) and Robert Sadusky (Air Force ROTC) participated in a study abroad program in Russia to study the Russian language and culture while Midshipmen Joshua Hollis and Joshua McColister (Naval ROTC) participated in an Arabic language immersion program at the University of Utah. Program expenses were fully funded by the Project GO grant including tuition, transportation and a living allowance. The goal this year is to at least double the number of ROTC students participating in study abroad and language immersion programs in Arabic, Chinese and Russian using grant funds. Grant funds are also being used to hire adjunct Arabic instructors and a Graduate Assistant in the World Languages Department to serve as a liaison to the Joint Military Leadership Center, ROTC programs and Study Abroad. COL Rocky Tyler, USA Reserve, has been selected to fill the Graduate Assistant position. COL Tyler is a doctoral student in the university's Second Language Acquisition and Instructional Technology (SLA/IT) program.

Project GO is a Department of Defense initiative sponsored by the National Security Education Program (NSEP). The goal of NSEP is to enhance the national security of the U.S. by increasing our national capacity to deal effectively with foreign cultures and languages. Project Go supports the achievement of this goal by affording ROTC students, America's future military "global officers", the opportunity to enhance their language proficiency and cultural awareness during their college years.
