

Admiral John Nathman, Commander Fleet Forces Command, visited the University of South Florida as part of his visit to the city of Tampa for Tampa Navy Week on 26 January 2006. During his visit to USF, Admiral Nathman visited with the Commanding Officer of the Naval ROTC unit, CAPT Marty Smith, representatives of the Joint Military Leadership Center.



After a brief meeting, Admiral Nathman spoke about the Navy today, specifically Maritime Security Operations, to an audience of about 150 Naval, Air Force and Army ROTC students and staff as well as students and professors from the university's International and Government Studies Department. In Maritime Security Operations, ADM Nathman pointed out the key role the Navy has taken in conjunction with the Coast Guard to search, track and in some cases apprehend potential terrorists and illicit cargo. His presentation also highlighted the Navy's humanitarian effort and disaster response to New Orleans and the Gulf Coast in the wake of Hurricane Katrina.

Lastly he discussed the Navy's long term capital investments in future weapon systems including the Joint Strike Fighter and DD(X), the Navy's next generation destroyer. Admiral Nathman's ended his presentation with an engaging question and answer session with the enthusiastic audience.

In addition to providing an overview of the mission of the United States Strategic Command, Major General Newton also gave extensive insights into the J-5, Plans and Policy function which he oversees on the STRATCOM staff. Two prevalent themes were hammered home by the General: the ongoing and absolutely required joint interoperability amongst all Services in the Global War on

Terrorism, and the fact that our students are laying the foundation in ROTC that will enable them to be confident and capable leaders, regardless of where they are in their respective careers. He underscored the value and importance of Selfless Service to our Nation---'why we do what we do!' General Newton then engaged the students in a dynamic, up-close, wide-ranging question and answer session that covered many topics and enabled students to gain invaluable personal and professional perspective

on a military career that, for them, will begin while the Nation is already engaging an enemy on many levels, and in many locations, around the world.

Curriculum Development



On March 15, 2006, Dr. Gilroy, Director of Accession Policy, visited Dr. Sullins, USF's Dean of Undergraduate Studies USF to discuss curriculum development and faculty requirements for teaching the proposed National Security Studies course and the proposed National Military Studies course. In addition, Dr. Gilroy was able to meet with Colonel Ward and members of his staff (AFROTC) and Lieutenant Colonel Self (AROTC) to receive a briefing on current programs. In the discussions with Dr. Sullins, issues pertaining to curriculum timelines and products as well as funding and faculty acquisition alternatives were shared. Dr. Gilroy left the ROTC briefings with words of appreciation and support for the innovative manner in which the ROTC units work to bring a sense of "jointness" into their programs.

In support of the proposed Minor in National Security Studies and Certificate in National Military Studies, we continue to work with the National Defense University for development of courses and intend to soon be able to formalize the program requests that will be submitted to the Undergraduate Council for consideration.

Construction Update

Through a series of meetings with J. Kokolakis Contracting, Inc., Baker Barrios Architectural firm, USF Facilities Planning and Construction and the Joint Military Science Leadership Center, the following details have been decided:

The third floor design and construction were approved. A new construction schedule was developed resulting in the delay of the projected completion date. The project is anticipated to complete in September 2007.

Three Planning Design Workshops were conducted since the construction update in our Fall issue of this publication on 17 November, 22 November and 27 January. The Design/Build team briefed President Judy Genshaft on 1 December 2005 to get her guidance on changes and to get her approval to proceed with building exterior color scheme.

The Groundbreaking Ceremony will be held in 11 September 2006.

Rear Admiral Harnitchek provided an exceptionally informative presentation on the synergy between the National Command Authority and the Joint Staff, and a deeper focus on the J-4 function for which he is the Vice Director. He also explained how the Joint Staff and nine Combatant Commanders work together, and well as the ways that the Geographic and Functional Combatant Commanders interface. By sharing an opening personal reflection about his collegiate days in ROTC at Penn State, and the lack of jointness at that time in that environment, and comparing it to those assembled before him, from the Army, Marine Corps, Navy, Air Force, and Coast Guard, the Admiral had the full attention of his audience as soon as he took the stage. Opening the floor for questions, topics went from the current and future capabilities of the United States to move equipment quickly and efficiently from CONUS to an overseas theater, to how best to engage collegiate professors and students who do not understand today's Military Culture.
